

At 9:30 A.M. our chartered bus leaves the LCHS Museum to meet our guide, Mrs. Clare Copeland, in Madison at 10:15.





HAPPY FIFTIETH TO VHS CLASS OF '44

The Valdosta High class of 1944 dedicated their "Sandspur" like this, "These pages we gratefully dedicate to those who are fighting that we may continue with the school life depicted in this annual."

There are photos of military persons, school clubs oriented with the wartime, plus regular clubs and photos of students and activities. The "Sandspur" was dedicated to a lady, teacher and friend we all love, Miss Fredeva Ogletree.

The 1944 class president was Carol Sherwood; vice-president, Albert Jones; and secretary-treasurer, Edwina (Bootsie) Roberts. The class

mascot was tiny baby, Howard Bridges, Jr., son of the principal.

"All for Dosta, Dosta for All" was a caption for the Dosta Outlook, the school newspaper, and that year marked the tenth anniversary of the school paper. The Outlook staff was Virginia Howell; editor; Tom Smith (Jr.), assistant editor, Sherla Miller, business manager, John Wiggins, assistant business mgr., and Peggy Reid, advertising manager.

The "Sandspur" editor was Bobbie Jones and assistant editor, Bobby Snow, and business manager, Jackie Talton. This 1944 "Sandspur" annual of VHS was maroon color with "Sandspur" written in sandspur color or sandy beige. One unique feature was a photo of a boy and girl in a country field, snapped waist down, covered with sandspurs. The caption was: "The 'Sandspur' staff hope that the pictures and articles published in these pages will enable memories of your high school days, like sandspurs, to 'stick with you' wherever you go."

School activities: Senior Tri-Hi-Y, Ann McGowan, president; H-Y, John Wiggins, president; and Beta Club, Jackie Talton, president. The VHS Band Director was Aaron Taylor. There was the Glee Club, Hilda Crum, president; Home Economics, Bobby Snow, president; The Land Division of the Victory Corps, Caro/ Sherwood, president; Sea Service, John Wiggins, president; Air Service, James Oliver, president; Community Service, Frances Mitchell (Jr.), president; and the Marionettes (drama group), Sherla Miller, president. Co-captains of the football team were the well-known and well-liked Glenn O'Neal and Julian LeFiles. Managers were Jimmy Beal, Richard Hemingway (Jr.), and Jeff Hunt (Soph.). Boys' and girls' basketball coaches were Buck Thomas and Mrs. Joe Baroni. Buck was also football coach.

One night the ten top beauty contestants were: Ann McGowan (first place), Judy Corbin, Laura Converse, Elaine Sims Hurt (third place), Grace Hiers, Frances Moxley (Jr.), Esther Landey, Virginia Howell,

Betty Caudle, and Cile Ferguson (third place).

Selected as outstanding were: John Wiggins, Sherla Miller, Elaine Sims Hurt, Bobbie Jones, Eula Mae Blackburn, Ann McGowan, Virginia Howell, Carol Sherwood, Adair Myddelton, and Bobby Snow.

And Who's Who were: Mr. and Miss VHS (most popular): Carol Sherwood and Virginia Howell; most versatile: Bobbie Jones and Carol Sherwood; most athletic: Sherla Miller and Norman Maiden; best looking: Mack Greer and Virginia Copeland; most intellectual: John Wiggins and Bobby Snow; most talented: James Pitts and Bobbie Jones; and most dependable; Hubert Alexander and Jackie Talton.

It was warstime for these kids and they pined: "The girl's preference for dolls has changed to a preference for soldiers and the preference of boys for soldiers has changed for a liking for dolls. But there are some things of our likes and beliefs have never changed..." After all, our lives, school, Valdosta and country...it was all worth fighting for.

As mentioned, Buck Thomas was football coach and that's because our Wright Bazemore was away at war himself. The mascot of the team was

"Bozy" Thomas, son of Buck.
