

# Collection Spotlight The Edwina Roberts Collection

Edwina Roberts was the hub around which the John T. and Kate Young Roberts family revolved. Miss Roberts was born and died in Valdosta's oldest house. From a young age she suffered from disabling physical ailments requiring constant care. During her 72 years she collected thousands of photographs of her family and friends and genealogical information. We are indeed fortunate to now house this collection. Donated by the Roberts descendants, in Edwina Roberts name, this collection includes photographic portraits, snapshots, and memorabilia. The Collection chronicles not only the Roberts family's history but gives us an important insight into Valdosta's history from the late 1800s until Miss Roberts' death in 1973.

Catherine L. Redles, Lonie Pendleton, Lilla Kate Hart, and Edwina "Bootsie" Smotherman, all nieces of Edwina Roberts, are volunteering their time to put the collection in order. They are organizing the photographs and papers into archival folders and identifying all items. This collection will be invaluable for researchers looking at Valdosta's first 100 years.

# Dr. Durrenberger Given Life Membership

Dr. Joseph Austin Durrenberger was given a life membership in LCHS at a special Board of Trustees meeting held July 13, 1999. In a resolution, the Trustees acknowledged his long, loyal, and commendable contributions to the Society. He served as President from 1974 to 1975 and as a Trustee for more than ten years. Even at the age of 100 years, he continues his participation in the Society's activities.

A native of Copper's Cove, Texas, Dr. Durrenberger came to Valdosta in 1929 as Professor of History and Social Sciences at Georgia State Womans College, now Valdosta State University. He retired July 1<sup>st</sup>, 1966 and continues to service as a Professor Emeritus. His activities extend beyond the academic sphere into Valdosta's civic, religious, and business organizations.

## Governors Honors 1999 Architectural Design Class



An enthusiastic group of young Governors Honors Students visited

the Museum to research Downtown Valdosta. This Architectural Design class was taught by Spencer Taylor, a Brooks County High School Technology Education and Drafting Instructor.

The class selected two Downtown Valdosta Historic District buildings for an adaptive reuse proposal. They chose 106-108 North Patterson Street. After field review and measurement, they constructed a scale model of these buildings incorporating their proposal for interior reuse. The outside appearance was preserved as closely as possible to the original while the inside reuse proposal was adapted to this earlier period.

The 1904 Valdosta Directory discloses that Harley Hardware Company occupied 106 while S. B. Goodwin's Sons, furniture, occupied 108.

The detailed scale model and a video of the project was given to LCHS. It is currently on display in the lower level. It is constructed in sections with removable modules so the interior may be viewed.

#### OLD LANDMARK PASSES FOR MODERN BUILDING

Work of dismantling the one-story brick building on North Patterson Street next to the First Methodist Church, formerly occupied by Blackburn's Studio and the Bryan and Bruce Cigar factory, was begun this a. m. In place of the old building will be erected a thoroughly modern and up-to-date theatre, the Valway. (Mrs. A. Converse owned the lot. The theatre would seat 800, with large stage for large shows, and, of course, movies. Theatre later called the Strand.)

Same date, Blackburn Studio was moving to 106 West Central Avenue, "In our new quarters, especially designed for our business."


#### INTEREST IN MEETING GROWS EVERY NIGHT.

The "Boosters" under the direction of Mrs. Harding gave their first program last night. It consisted of short recitations by individuals; and by all the "Boosters" in concert. Some of these had a splendid personal message for all. There were several songs, one of which was accompanied by a flag drill which appealed to the patriotic spirit in all. The special features were the recitation by Miss Dorothy Hereford, and the marching drill by the six Misses Daltons. The children showed in their work the influence of a controlling hand. The program was greatly enjoyed by the great audience which filled the house, who came to the meeting. There will be baptisms Friday night.

It was decided that such pavilion would be an added attraction to the park and accordingly it was decided to erect a pavilion 35 by 70 feet... The matter of naming the park came up. It was decided, upon motion, to name it Brookwood Park.

# AMUSEMENT LANDMARK IS NOW PASSING AWAY FAIR BUILDINGS AT PINE PARK ARE BEING DISMANTLED...

(Pine Park, for fairs and circuses, was the area Park Avenue, Williams Street, Moore Street, and Patterson Street.)

One of the landmarks of South Georgia is disappearing now as the work program dismantles the fair building at Pine Park, and those who might, for any reason, want to take a last look at them, should lose no time, as the buildings are beginning to come down

For twenty years Pine Park has been the amusement center of South Georgia and North Florida during the fall season and the grounds and buildings there each year have been thronged with sightseers and those bent on pleasure. Originally built to house the Georgia State Fair, which occupied the buildings and grounds for a period of three years, the buildings have since been used for other fairs, and during the last five years they were the home of the Georgia-Florida Fair.

Later on in the season, new and imposing buildings will arise in the new fair ground, and by fall will be ready for the thousands who will come, as usual, to Valdosta for the annual exhibition of the Georgia-Florida Fair.

(The new fair grounds were on Forrest Street, site of Crackin' Good Bakers.)

A page of Valdosta history is now being torn down and a new history written of more modern methods.
