Patricia Trotter Giles

Patricia (Patsy) Trotter Giles, 77, of Valdosta died on Tuesday, November 3, 2020 at her residence. She was born on April 6, 1943 in Royston, Georgia to the late Richard and Betty Lou Royston Trotter.

Upon graduating high school in Gainesville, GA, she attended Brenau College, married, and moved to Valdosta.

Her involvement with the Valdosta/Lowndes County community and the pride she felt and displayed for the history and culture of Lowndes County was inspiring.

Her contributions to the community included but was not limited to involvement with the Valwood Parents Club, Coastal Plain RSVP Program and Head Start Program, the Crescent Garden Club, Holly Garden Club, a long-time member of the Valdosta Tree Commission that worked with several Arbor Day celebrations and was also instrumental in initiating the Trees for Patterson Project in the 1990's.

Patsy was a 2007 Certified Master Gardener with the Georgia Master Gardeners and served as the first secretary for the Grand Bay Master Gardeners.

She was also actively involved with promoting a deep respect for the historical preservation of this community by serving on the Board of Directors of the Valdosta Heritage Foundation, working in preparation of historic driving tours. long serving President of the Lowndes County Historical Society, spearheading the purchase of the former Dr. Frank Bird Hospital and its rehabilitation for the museum annex, and recently served with the Valdosta/Lowndes Convention and Tourism Authority.

Patsy was appreciated as an event planner by many organizations. She was a member of First Baptist Church of Valdosta.

Anita Hatcher Shelton

Anita Hatcher Shelton, 98, of Valdosta, died on Monday, August 17, 2020 at Langdale Hospice House following a lengthy illness.

She was born on August 22, 1921 in Dothan, Alabama to the late Thomas Eifel (T.E.) Hatcher and Hettie Lee Kirkland Hatcher.

Mrs. Hatcher attended the Georgia Women's College upon graduating high school and later married George Lang Shelton, Jr.

She attended Lee Street Baptist Church where she taught the four-year old Sunday school class for many years.

She was a member of the Lowndes County Historical Society and was a long-time member of the Board of Trustees.

Mrs. Shelton was also a long-time board member of Friends of the Library for South Georgia Regional Library and a volunteer for the Turner Art Center. She was a member of First Christian Church.

At the time of our 40th Anniversary, the museum wanted to confirm when the Jingle Bell Christmas tree was first prepared. This information was found in a previous newsletter and reprinted at that time.

Louie Peeples White remembered Patsy Giles coming up with the idea when she served on Louie's LCHS Trustee Executive Committee, but neither could pinpoint the initial year. Patsy remembered Louie purchasing window display Christmas bells from C. C. Varnedoe for their historic effect on the tree. In searching through Albert's newsletters we find this mention in the December 1993 issue. "The reason we are writing about Pierpont again (briefly) is because this year at the museum we will have a 'Jingle Bells' tree in honor of the author. The tree is decorated with bells brought in by you and with some bells we already have, all thanks to Patsy Giles."

Eleanor Morgan Howard

Eleanor Morgan Howard was born in Aline, Georgia, to Mrs. and Mrs. W.A. Morgan. The family moved to Valdosta when she was a child. As an adult, she resided on Brookwood Place until 2019 when she moved into Langdale Place. She passed away on Sunday, August 30, 2020.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church of Valdosta where she sang many solos with the choir. She was a longtime member of the Christian Homebuilders Sunday School class. She enjoyed her other interests with the Lowndes County Historical Society, Turner Center for the Arts, Book Review Club, supper club, bridge club, Retired Teachers Association, and Bible studies.

Eleanor was a gifted contralto singer who sang for many weddings, funerals, and with Botie Chitty and the Singing Americans. In high school she won a radio contest to sing on Cuban radio.

Among her varied interests were reading, traveling, interior decorating, gardening, cooking, entertaining, singing, collecting porcelain and elephants. She traveled to India, Egypt, Jordan, Israel, Lebanon, Turkey, and most of Europe. She and Riley were frequent guests of honor of the Berlin, Germany, government for memorial celebrations of the lifting of the Berlin blockade in 1949.

Mrs. Howard was an elementary school teacher, teaching in Valdosta City Schools and in Germany. She earned two Master's degrees from Valdosta State College and retired from Sallas Mahone as a reading specialist.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Captain William R. Howard, who died August 24, 1948, while flying a mission for the Berlin Airlift.

She was also preceded in death by her sisters, Jennie Ruth Sherman and Dorothy Evans Mackey, and her nephew, Mercer Sherman.

Eleanor is survived by her son, William Riley Howard (Jenny), step-grandson, James Upchurch (Melanie) of Gig Harbor, WA, and step-granddaughters Brynnlie and Kinsley
